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TEN COMMANDMENTS: A COMPASS FOR A LIFE WORTH LIVING

This month, our tour of our stained glass windows takes us up into the church balcony, where we find our "Ten Commandments Window." The Ten Commands are typically symbolized by two stone tablets with the first 3 commandments (here represented by Roman numerals) on one and the following 7 on the other. These are often referred to as the two "tables" of the law—the first having to do with our *direct* relationship with God and the second having to do with our relationship with our neighbor, beginning with our parents.

It should be noted, by the way, that Lutherans and Roman Catholics number the commandments differently than others faith traditions. Where our second commandment is about not misusing the God's name, others include before it a prohibition against idolatry. And where we have two commandments (numbers 9 and 10) dealing with "coveting," others combine these into one. (A further discussion of this can be found on my monthly meditation page on our website.)

There have been disagreements about the commandments, even among Lutherans, as to how one ought to *use* them. This has lead to an understanding of up to three uses, or purposes, of the law: 1) to restrain public or civil evil; 2) to show us our sins so that we might turn in repentance to Christ; and 3) as a guide for how, once we have been redeemed by Christ, to live our lives as Christians.

There is little time here to discuss in what way God's law can and ought to shape our civil society, which is one area of diagreement. In a society that values the separation of religious and civil life, it would be difficult, if not impossible (and probably misguided) to try to legislate a binding and comprehensive religious moral code. Theocracies have *always* been a source of civic terror as they are the antithesis of democracy and freedom. But this is not to say that the commandments are irrelevant to us.

When I read the command to have no other god

before God, if I am open and honest with myself, I realize how far I have fallen. By "god", with a small "g", we don't mean some Canaanite fertility god that may have been the concern of ancient Israelites, but *anything* that we might turn to in times of trouble as a replacement for our full "fear, love and trust" in God (big "G"). One example of my personal idolatry is evident in the fact that I tend to find myself trusting more in the promise of *money* to provide security for me in times of trouble than I do in the promise of God. And if I go beyond the *surface* of these commandments and unpack them the way Jesus did, they each are literally impossible to follow. When the commandment forbidding murder is stretched

so far as to prohibit negative *thoughts* toward my neighbor (see Matthew 5:22), there is no escape. It is no wonder that this "second" use of the law "drives us to the foot of the cross" where we find, in Jesus' death and resurrection, hope and forgiveness.

But now what? Is that all that the com-

mandments are good for? If I had to chose

sides, I would stand with those who find that the 10 Commanments serve as a practical guide through life. This in no way turns them into the "10 *Suggestions*." On the contrary, it opens them up to us in a way that brings life and oppportunity and not mere condemnation. Like a compass, they show us where God would have us go. And trusting in the power of the

Take a moment, if you are able, and look how Luther, in his *Small Catechism*, unpacks each commandment. (If you don't have a copy of this, ask and I'll be happy to give you one.) When, for example, it says in the fifth commandment, "You shall not murder," something most of us will likely avoid in this life, Luther opens this up by explaining, "We are to fear and love God, so that we neither endanger nor harm the lives of our neighbors," — so far so good— "but instead *help and support them in all of life's needs.*" Now *that* is a vision I can live my whole life trying to fulfill.

Holy Spirit, we are able set off on our journey.



SURVEY REPORT

The following is the remainder of the Survey Report that was first printed in October's Epistle. In bold are the questions that were asked to you who responded. Below these are brief summaries of your responses. This report was submitted by Winnie Sawrun.

1. Do you have any suggestions on how to improve the quality of our worship services?

There were several comments, suggestions, & alternative service times. The frequency of communion be limited or alternated between services. Announcements should be reduced it is not necessary to repeat what is already printed in the bulletin. It was noted that visitors often find the service materials confusing. The service should be more family friendly & reduce interruptions by children coming in and out during the service.

2. Do you have any suggestions on how to get the word out about St. Paul's Lutheran Church?

Respondents agreed there is a need to advertise & publicize planned events. It was noted that "keeping the lights on" while events are occurring will attract interest. Specific suggestions for special events included hosting an open house, grief counseling, other guest speakers, Thanksgiving Ecumenical service or a healing service could be offered & making more use of the PE building. We need to spread the Word & share our St. Paul's success stories. Contact with visitors should be emphasized & to also create an active recruiting team.

3. How frequently do you attend worship?

Most answering said they attend weekly, two or three times a month.

4. Adult Education and Spiritual Growth: Do you attend Bible Study? If not what would encourage you to attend?

Most do not attend Bible Study & commented it was a time commitment problem. Some suggestions were, alternative times, other types of studies, using current events, & providing an interactive discussion rather than a lecture format. Those that have attended commented on the depth of Pastor Hugh's knowledge and noted it was thought provoking and inspiring.

5. Do you have pre-school or school age children?

Most congregants do not have pre-school or school age children. (9 out of 49)

6. Would you like to be contacted to personally discuss your concerns or suggestions?

Eight people said they would like to be contacted for further discussion. A team member and/or Pastor Hugh will contact those people. It was specifically suggested we reach out to the younger people for their opinions and suggestions.

We had many, comments. You really let us know how you were feeling about our church. It would take several pages to go through all the ideas presented. In the next several months the church committees & the council members will go over the surveys again to hopefully solve some problems.

Some items to work on or that in progress are:

- Fine tune the PA system
- Sunday worship more visitors friendly
- Recruit council members
- Shorter service
- Cut out announcements
- Advertise special events in publications
- Design a survey for Bible Study
- Establish a committee to contact vanishing parishioners to find out why?

There is more to do to find out where we want to go as active Christians and the part we need to have St. Paul's Church to take in that journey. Please feel free to speak with anyone on the survey committee or Pastor Hugh.
