

St. Paul's Welcomes the Lois Woy Memorial Organ

It's been long journey, but the installation of the new St. Paul's Organ is complete. We are deeply grateful for the generous donations from Lois Woy, Louise Lostocco, Salem Church, and our friends, family and neighbors which enabled us to purchase the organ.

With the assistance of a consultant, the new organ committee gathered bids from Arizona, Minnesota, New York and Poland. St. Paul's Church members approved the purchase of the new organ on September 10, 2023. We went with the newest technology, "Hauptwerk," which uses digital samples of recordings from renowned organs from around the world.



The organ company we selected was Arnold Organs, of Barnum Minnesota. We moved our 37 year old Allen organ from the sanctuary into the narthex on Sunday, May 19, with a lot of help from friends and parishioners:

Matthew Arnold of Arnold Organs, left on Wednesday May 30, 2024 driving a minivan from Minnesota containing our new organ. He arrived at St. Paul's Church at 9:15 Friday May 31. He unloaded and assembled the organ, and I was able to play it at 6:00 that night. Patty and Russ Bengtson were there as well, and we were thrilled to hear the beautiful sounds.





The new organ was first played on Sunday June 2, 2024. The recorded digital sample set came from the William Hill organ, built in the 1860's in England, recently moved to Berlin, Germany.

William Hill Organ:



The English organs were designed to accompany choirs, liturgy and hymns. This is a particularly versatile and beautiful instrument. We used the digitally recorded sounds from this organ through the end of September.

The digital samples of the remaining organs were installed on Thursday October 3. Including the William Hill organ, we now have four different types of organ sounds to use.

St. Martini Organ, the Netherlands

The St. Martini Church organ, in Groningen, the Netherlands, was originally placed in the church in 1450. The famous organbuilder, Arp Schnitger, completed work in 1691. This organ is considered a baroque organ, although work continued on it through the 19th century. This organ has a North German baroque sound, suitable for works by Bach, Buxtehude and Pachelbel.

The St. Martini Church organ, in Groningen, the Netherlands, was originally placed in the church in 1450. The famous organ builder, Arp Schnitger, completed work in 1691. This organ is considered a baroque organ, although work continued on it through the 19th century. This organ has a North German baroque sound, suitable





Silbermann Organ, Wasselonne, Franc

The organ of Wasselonne was built by a very famous organ building family, Andre and Jean-Andre Silbermann. This organ is built in the French Classic (18th century) style. Work initially began in 1734 and continued through the 19th century. The organ we have is suitable for works by French composers Daquin and Balbastre. Many French Noels will sound beautiful with this sample set.



Organ of the St. Etienne Abbey, Caen France – Organ Builder Cavaillé-Coll

The Cavaillé-Coll organ was completed in 1885. The organ builder Cavaillé-Coll sound is famous for its French symphonic style, which includes lush romantic strings, and melodious and sumptuous sounds. There is an entire school of French composers who wrote music for this type of organ including Vierne, Widor, Dupre.

It is an absolute privilege and pleasure to play the new organ, using the sounds from these spectacular instruments every week. If you ever have any questions, or want to know which instrument I was using, please come up to me after the worship service and I will be happy to explain. We are planning to hold an installation concert in March, 2025 as well as an open house for local organists to come, listen, and

try out the new instrument. But wait, what happened to our old organ? After faithfully serving our church for 37 years, our Allen organ was stored in the Narthex over the summer. St. John's Lutheran Church in Stamford has both a large sanctuary with a pipe organ, as well as a smaller chapel which seats about 50 people. They hold services in both locations. They needed an organ for the chapel, and were thrilled to receive our Allen organ. They came to St. Paul's on October 11 with a pick-up truck, trailer and SUV to bring our Allen to its new home.



Here is the Thank You we received from St John's Cantor and Ministry associate, Nathan Lively-Greyling

"Thank you all so much for this amazing gift to our chapel congregation. They are often overlooked by the choral service in the Nave. The Allen played for the first time on Reformation Sunday. It rumbled out "A Mighty Fortress" for the congregation. My friend from Allen Organs sent us all the wires and connectors and talked me through the voicing process. Full organ is just a soft purr in the small space, which is great. Otherwise, it's in great shape. "

Pastor Elizabeth and I attended the dedication of the new organ at St. John's Evensong service on Sunday evening, 11/17. So many old electronic organs are being thrown out now. We are very happy that our reliable Allen organ has a new church home.

We will never forget the people whose generous stewardship made our new organ possible!


